As an AAPI organization, VAYLA has a unique focus on communities that have been previously left out of reproductive justice discussions. This summer, I will be working within the youth reproductive justice program. So far, I have begun reading AAPI Racial Justice workshops and started working on curriculum for the youth reproductive justice program.

I will also be working on VAYLA's social media and outreach. I'm excited to gain awareness about reproductive justice work in New Orleans, knowledge about developing a reproductive justice curriculum, and a greater proficiency in graphic design.
