I found the whole thing very inspiring and moving.

Detail what you learned that you hope to never forget:

I think the most important thing I learned at PLEN was that the next generation of policy-makers needs to start reaching across the aisle no matter how they disagree. Every single panelist and speaker told us to always be kind and never be afraid of asking for what you think you deserve. I hope I can carry these ideas with me throughout my career.

Other students should attend PLEN because it instills the knowledge necessary to feel confident going after what you want. Having the skills to network and advocate for what I believe in is making my job search feel much less stressful.
