These non-probability panelists were asked a series of demographic profile questions that were not asked of AmeriSpeak panelists because that information was already on file. This demographic profile questions asked only of non-probability panelists are also not included here. At the end of the document, all of the demographic, socio-economic and household profile measures that have been asked of AmeriSpeak prior to the survey and included with the final delivered data are noted.
