DISTINGUISHED NEWCOMB FELLOW Anneliese Singh, Ph.D., LPC (NC '91)



Dr. Anneliese Singh (she/they) serves as Associate Provost for Diversity and Faculty Development and Chief Diversity Officer at Tulane University, where she is also a professor. As Chief Diversity Officer, Dr. Singh leads Tulane's strategic initiatives in equity, diversity, inclusion, and anti-racism work. Dr. Singh's scholarship and community organizing explores racial healing, racial justice, and racial trauma. She conducts research funded by the National Institutes of Health on the resilience, trauma, identity development, and cardiovascular health of trans and nonbinary communities, with a focus on Black, Indigenous, and people of color, and young people. Dr. Singh is also the author of *The Racial Healing Handbook: Practical Activities to Help You Challenge Privilege, Confront Systemic Racism, and Engage in Collective Healing*

and *The Queer and Trans Resilience Workbook*. Dr. Singh is a co-founder of the Georgia Safe Schools Coalition and the Trans Resilience Project to help translate research findings into real-life systemic and social change efforts.

Mortar Board Zeaching Awards

Each year, the Newcomb-sponsored chapter of the national honor society Mortar Board honors one tenured and one non-tenured Tulane faculty member with the Excellence in Teaching awards.

Jenny Mercein, M.F.A.

Excellence in Teaching Award, Tenured Faculty

Jenny Mercein is an actor, teacher, director, and writer currently living in New Orleans, where she is an Associate Professor at Tulane University. She is a proud producer of *Roleplay*, a play and documentary film project exploring student perspectives on love, sex, power, and consent. The script for *Roleplay* is published by Dramatic Publishing. She is also the co-creator of the acclaimed docudrama *X's and O's*, about football and traumatic brain injury, which received the Rella Lossy Award Playwright Award. Her new solo show *Two Elizas*, created with support from the Newcomb Institute, will premiere at Luna Stage in West Orange, New Jersey this May.

Mercein's directing credits include *Dance Nation* (Tulane), *Grýla* (RVK Fringe Festival, Iceland, KC Fringe, Kansas City), *Gratitude Assignment* (Tulane), *The Metromaniacs* (Tulane), *Dancing at Lughnasa* (Tulane),

Too Much Water (UCSB), and Heathers the Musical (Out of the Box Theatre, Santa Barbara). Her acting credits include Your Honor, NCIS: New Orleans, 30 Rock, Blue Bloods, Unforgettable, Law & Order, and extensive theater credits spanning the country. A proud member of AEA, SAG-AFTRA, and the National Alliance of Acting Teachers, Mercein received a Bachelor of Arts in theater studies and the history of art from Yale University and a Master of Fine Arts in acting from the University of Washington.

Emilia Oddo, Ph.D.

Excellence in Teaching Award, Non-Tenured Faculty



Dr. Emilia Oddo is an Assistant Professor of Greek Archaeology. Her interests are centered on the archaeology of Crete in the Bronze Age, especially the Late Bronze Age (Neopalatial period, ca. 1700-1470 BCE). In the course of over a decade of field experience, Dr. Oddo has specialized in Neopalatial pottery analysis. Much of her research has focused on the ways in which pottery style is manipulated to convey the identities of different geographical areas of Crete as well as different socio-political groups. This line of work is illustrated in Oddo's recent publications on the pottery of Southeast Crete: "Pottery Styles and Social Dynamics at Neopalatial Myrtos-Pyrgos: Identifying Southeast Crete as a Ceramic Region" (AJA 2019) and the two edited volumes *Exploring a Terra Incognita: Recent Research on Bronze Age Habitation in the Southern Ierapetra Isthmus* (2019, with K. Chalikias) and *South by Southeast: The History and Archaeology of Southeast*

Crete, from Myrtos to Kato Zakros (2022, with K. Chalikias).

Moving beyond the Southeast, Dr. Oddo has broadened the scope of her research to include North-central Crete in her new book, titled *Knossos: The House of the Frescoes* (2022), where she analyses pottery and other material remains from building excavated by A. Evans in 1923 in Knossos, the site considered to have politically and culturally dominated Crete.

Newcomb Alumnae Association Outstanding Alumna Award Alexandra "Ally" Coll, J.D. (NC '07)



Since earning her B.A. in History and Political Science from Newcomb College in 2007, Ally Coll has dedicated herself to advancing civil rights and equality under the law. After working in electoral politics for several years, Coll earned her J.D. from Harvard Law School, where she served on the Board of the Harvard Women's Law Association and as the Executive Policy Editor of the Harvard Law and Policy Review. A native of Washington D.C., she also spent time working on Capitol Hill in both chambers of Congress as the Press Secretary for the U.S. Senate Budget Committee and Elections Counsel for the U.S. House Committee on Administration.

In 2017, Coll joined the law firm Boies Schiller Flexner, LLP as a litigation associate. Six months into her time at the firm, Tarana Burke's longstanding #MeToo movement went viral, and the news broke that Coll's firm had been representing Harvey Weinstein and the Weinstein Company. She ultimately left the firm to launch the Purple Campaign, a non-profit organization dedicated to addressing workplace harassment. In the five years since its founding, the organization has formed partnerships with corporations representing millions of workers around the world, successfully advocated for the enactment of state and federal laws to address workplace harassment, and provided tools and resources to empower employees to create change in their own workplaces.

Coll is now an Assistant Professor of Legal Studies at George Mason University's Schar School of Policy and Government, where she teaches Constitutional and Civil Rights Law.

Newcomb Alumnae Association Community Service Award Susan Friedlander Keith (NC '68)



Susan Friedlander Keith's community involvement has been long-term and impactful. Keith graduated from Newcomb College in 1968 with a B.A. in French. After completing her education, she lived in Washington D.C. with her family for twenty years, where she established her business, Culture to Culture. Through Culture to Culture, Keith provided training and marketing services that emphasized cultural variables and the value of international expansion to businesses.

After relocating with her family to Albuquerque, Keith was able to provide similar services for several companies in New Mexico. In 1997, she was asked to help a group of farmers create a marketing plan for their business. Keith secured funding from the Mid Region Council of Governments (MRCOG) to conduct market research for local agricultural products. When said research indicated that there was a viable market opportunity, Keith created the Agriculture Collaborative, which brought together a wide range of stakeholders, including agriculture extension agents, restaurants, water specialists, pueblos, schools, academics, and political representatives, for monthly meetings related to local agriculture.

Keith managed the Agriculture Collaborative from 2003 to 2008. In 2007, MRCOG decided to fund the initiative as a permanent program. Today, almost twenty years after it began, the program is still in operation, providing an opportunity for producers to gain critical information about factors influencing their work and raising awareness in the general Albuquerque community about the importance of local agriculture.


In 2019, Keith began volunteering with Project ECHO, a research organization in Albuquerque, to help the organization reach its goal of expanding access to healthcare knowledge to one billion people by 2025.

Newcomb Alumnae Association Young Alumna Award Brittney Sheena (SSE '18)



Brittney Sheena is building momentum in the fields of medicine, public health, and health equity. After graduating from Tulane in 2018, Sheena accepted a global health research fellowship at the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation, while pursuing her Master of Public Health at the University of Washington. She researched the global burden of hepatitis and cirrhosis, and collaborated with the Coalition for Global Hepatitis Elimination and World Health Organization to track progress toward elimination goals. At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, Sheena used seasonal trends of pneumonia to develop a novel seasonality covariate that expanded temporal and geographic projections. Her work contributed to accurately predicting rising cases and deaths in colder months, and helped guide policy for the Pan American Health Organization.

In 2021, Sheena worked as a Program Director with the Albert Schweitzer Fellowship Houston-Galveston. She mentored medical students on community-based projects that addressed unmet health needs in underserved populations in Houston. Sheena began her own medical education in 2022 at the Tulane University School of Medicine. She serves as a Student Clinic Leader at Ozanam Inn, providing free medical care to community members at one of the largest homeless shelters in New Orleans. Sheena is also a Civic Health Alliance Ambassador, and works to increase civic participation among healthcare workers, students, and patients, and break down the systems that often bring patients to them in the first place. Sheena is passionate about advancing health through patient-centered care, public health, and advocacy.











Josephine Louise Newcomb founded the H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College in 1886 in memory of her only daughter, Harriott Sophie Newcomb. Her gift to the Tulane University Board of Administrators created the first degree-granting college for women within a university in America.

The mission of the College evolved with political and societal events. During both World Wars, Newcomb women filled military roles abroad and support roles at home. During peacetime, the student body grew and became more diverse. The women's movement encouraged Newcomb students to enroll in classes and pursue fields traditionally reserved for men.

Newcomb Institute began operating on July 1, 2006 to provide academic and leadership programs. Each year since its inception, the Institute has hosted speakers across academic disciplines and professions; presented events focusing on leadership, academics, and career preparedness; funded student research, faculty development, and community rebuilding initiatives, and upheld the traditions of the College through events such as Under the Oaks.

Mission Statement

The H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College Institute shapes the future by educating students to achieve gender equity. It is our mission to develop leaders, discover solutions to the intractable gender problems of our time, and to provide opportunities for students through curricula, research, community engagement, and close collaboration with faculty.

Daisy Chain

Daisy Chain was part of Newcomb College commencement ceremonies since the College's early days. The chains were made from clover, oleander, magnolias, or daisies, and were collected from campus gardens and neighbors' yards. Later chains consisted of more than 1,000 daisies assembled by outstanding representatives of the junior class. Although daisy chains were once a frequent sight on women's college campuses, the Newcomb Institute chain is one of the few remaining in the country.



The Brown Robes

The brown robes displayed at Under the Oaks are replicas of the robes made at the beginning of the 20th century and passed from class to class to be worn by the Class President and Class Speaker. The original robes were embroidered each year with the year of the graduating class, beginning in 1910. The original robes have been placed in the Newcomb Archives. Robes bearing the Newcomb crest that adorned the original gowns were made in 2001 and will continue to be passed from one graduating class to the next.

Newcomb Pin

The Newcomb pin is a longstanding tradition, carried forward from 1894 to commemorate the first Newcomb class pin.

Newcomb Mortar Board Decal

The Newcomb Mortar Board decal—the blue "N"—is formed by three pillars representing past, present, and future.

Newcomb Leadership Commemorative Cord

The Newcomb Leadership Commemorative Cord is a way for our student leaders to remember their time at Tulane, and involvement with Newcomb Institute. The threads of the cord weave together to bond each one into a stronger cord, symbolizing that we are strongest when we work together.

Traditions like the pin, the decal, our Daisy Chain, and the Brown Robes have bound together Newcomb Alumnae throughout the generations.
